

Illinois State Genealogical Society Description Of Illinois Prairie Pioneer Certificate

The word Illinois, of Indian and French derivation, means 'tribe of men'. Discovered in 1673, it wasn't until December 3, 1818, that Illinois became a State. Known as the prairie state, many of the pioneer settlers in Illinois lived in log cabins. The trees behind the cabin are white oak, the state tree, which is sometimes referred to as the patriarch of trees. It is the mightiest tree in the mid-western forests, growing stronger and more flourishing from age to age. Symbolically it stands for bravery, sturdiness, and virtue.

The white-tailed deer is the state animal. It is a beautiful swift footed animal of keen vision. Violets, the state flower, grow wild in Illinois, and are found scattered generously throughout the state. They are a symbol of loyalty.

The monarch butterfly is the state insect. The flight of this butterfly is slow, but powerful. The state bird is the cardinal; it remains a resident during the entire year, rarely going more than ten miles from where it was born.

All of the state symbols were chosen by the school children of Illinois. The state tree and flower became official in 1908, the state bird in 1928, the insect in 1975, and the animal in 1981. They are certainly fitting symbols for the great State of Illinois.

OBJECTIVES OF THE EARLY PIONEERS OF WARREN COUNTY, IL.

The prime objectives of the Early Pioneers of Warren County, Il., are to identify and honor the memory of the earliest pioneers of the county of Warren, and to show the proven pioneer's lasting mark on the county they helped to develop, by honoring their descendants.

The research and work necessary to discovering the pioneers and their descendants is intended to foster and encourage increasing interest in the people who contributed in any way, great or small, to establish the county of Warren.

REQUIREMENTS FOR MEMBERSHIP IN THE EARLY PIONEERS OF WARREN COUNTY, IL. YOU must become a member of the Warren Co, Il. Genealogical Society (WCGS) to apply for membership in the Early Pioneers of Warren Co., Il. (EPWC) Applicants for Early Pioneers of Warren Co, Il. must complete an EPWC application form, showing their Warren County Pioneer Ancestor(s), listing their descent from the Pioneer Ancestor(s), and PROVING their descent and the Pioneer Ancestor(s) settlement in what is now the County of Warren, Il. before the year 1850. Since Henderson Co was a part of Warren until 1841, those living there before that time will also qualify. The Early Pioneers of Warren Co, Il. application MUST be accompanied by copies of all

documents necessary to: (1) prove the Pioneer(s) settlement in Warren Co, Il. before 1850, and (2) prove each step of descent from the Pioneer to the applying member.PROOF may not be omitted for any step. These document copies may be either: (1) copy-machine, photo, or other facsimilies of the original document, or (2) EXACT typed, or hand-printed copies of the original document cetified as "True copies" by a courthouse official, genealogical librarian, or other official. ALL proof documents MUST show their SOURCE. A story/biography of the ancestor and the family is REQUIRED to accompany the application. The story may include family traditions, articles from county histories, etc., but must be shown as such, so it cannot be mistaken as documented proof. These stories are being collected in an effort to show more information about the people themselves that may not be possible to show with documentation alone. Story should include applicant through their honored ancestor and may include even earlier ancestors.

Application for membership in the Early Pioneers of Warren Co, Il. MUST be accompanied by the \$15.00 application fee, which covers Pioneer Ancestor(s) who settled in Warren Co, Il. before 1850. A member receiving a certificate may obtain additional certificates for their family members with documented proof of relationship and waive their Society membership requirement. If extra certificate is requested at the time of the original application, a \$7.50 fee is required, with proof of relationship, additional certificates requested at a later date: a \$9.00 fee & continuing lineage record must be submitted to Early Pioneer Committee.

EPWC applications may be leably handprinted or typed, and with their accompanying proof are file: with the Warren County Early Pioneer Certificate Committee. The committee chirman approves the application by signature, or requests further proof from the applicant.

The final step in the EPWC application process, is presentation by the committee chairman, to the Bord of Directors for acceptance and signature of the President of the WCGS.

The Rules of Evidence applying to membership in the Early Pioneers of Warren County, Ill. are listed on the other side of this sheet. These rules are the standard by which the proof is judged.

The nature and extant of the evidence submitted as proof in this application shall be sufficient to prove that the applicant is directly descended from the Pioneer Ancestor(s) named in paragraph E of the application, and sufficient to differentiate between any two persons of the same name residing in the same area at the same time.

BASIC RULES OF EVIDENCE

- 1. Primary or collateral evidence from vital statistics, court house or other Government records, church and school records, etc., are considered usually to be beyond doubt, and excellent proof.
- 2. Secondary evidence, such as Census records, newspaper clippings, old letters, Bible or other family records Contemporary to the Facts Reported, are considered almost as authentic.
- 3. Circumstantial evidence, implied facts, or hearsay are not considered as proof, unless backed up by secondary evidence.
- 4. Oral, written, or published family traditions are often wrong, and are not accepted as proof.
- 5. Printed or manuscript genealogies, genealogical records, or genealogical compilations are <u>not</u> accepted as proof, unless they are well documented themselves and proved, or unless they are backed up by other acceptable proof. Family group sheets and unsupported information from an amatuer or professional genealogist are considered in this context as genealogies, and not acceptable as proof.
- 6. Lineage papers from other patriotic or hereditary societies, by themselves are not considered proof. The document copies used for proving the lineages might be considered proof, if they follow these rules of evidence.
- 7. Material authored by the applicant, or his family, cannot be used as evidence.
- 8. Documents used as proof must, either by themselves, or in conjunction with other acceptable documents, actually state the fact to be proved. If the document merely implies the fact, this is not considered proof. An example is the expression "heirs" or "heirs at law" used in some estates. This indicates different things in different states, and at different times, and is not necessarily a proof of direct descent. If these statements are to be used as proof of direct descent, the application must include with his application, copies of the inheritance law of the state, showing that, at the year the proving document was dated, it was proof of descent "in the blood line", and must also include proof that the Testator had at least one child. Illinois laws on inheritance have changed many times through it's history, and what is true during one period, may not be true at another. Other examples of implied evidence which are not acceptable are: (a) Census records that list only the Head of Household with numbers for other family members. These unnamed persons are not proved as children. wives, nor as

- residents, no matter how well they match with other records. (b) A father is not proved as being in the area just because a child was born there. A birth only proves that the mother was there on the date of birth. (c) Blood descent is not proved by owning the same land as an earlier owner just because the names are the same, whether the land was inherited, or purchased.
- 9. Old letters, family records, etc., can be accepted as proof for only the facts the writer of the record or letter would be logically known, of his or her own knowledge. They cannot be accepted as proof for facts the writer could only have obtained by hearsay from older generations or other sources. Identification of the writer and the date of the letter or record are a must. The same rule applies to county histories.
- 10. Land transactions (deeds, warrants, grants, etc.) can only be accepted as evidenc of settlement in Warren County, Ill. before 1850, if the record actually states that the individual was of Warren County, and was dated prior to 1850. There were many absentee land owners who never set foot in the county.
- 11. Proving female ancestors as settled in Warren County, Ill. before 1850 is usually difficult. They must be proved as individuals by their maiden name. Birth and death records of their children usually do. These, in conjunction with a deed dated before 1850 showing (1) her married name with her husband (2) their place of residence as Warren County, Ill., is one way of proving before "1850" residence of females.
- 12. The ancestor(s) proved in Warren County, Ill. before 1850 <u>must</u> be in a direct line back from the paternal or maternal ancestors of the applicant. "Collateral Descent" (relationship back to the brother or sister) is <u>not</u> an allowed line for an Early Pioneer Certificate.
- 13. All proof documents must indicate their source. Bible records must be submitted with their title page, showing the publication date. Newspaper clippings must be identified by their date of appearance and the name of the newspaper.
- 14. Typed, handwritten, or printed copies of original documents, to be considered as proof must be certified as TRUE COPIES by a court house or other official. An applicant cannot certify his own documents.
- 15. When a father and/or mother are above the normal age for having children the parentage is suspect, and must be proven without a doubt.
- 16. Photographs of tomostones usually prove only birth and death dates. However, sometimes relationships are shown on the tombstone and are considered good proof.
- 17. Married female applicants must include a copy of their marriage license, or record, to prove their married name.
- 18. It is suggested that a copy of the Ancestor(s) surname from the alphabetized Census index for the time period, viz. 1850 etc. of Warren County, Ill., or other relevant states or counties; be included as part of the proof.
- 19. If more than two ancestral lines are to be submitted it is requested that an ancestral chart be included to show the inter-connection of relationships.

ILLINOIS STATE GENEALOGICAL SOCIETY PRAIRIE PIONEER CERTIFICATE

The Illinois State Genealogical Society will issue Prairie Pioneer Certificates to direct descendants of early settlers of Illinois. Many of these pioneers have gone unnoticed in history, so this is a way to gather information about them. Eventually the information submitted will be published in book form. In addition to receiving a Prairie Pioneer Certificate, applicants will be helping to preserve the history of ancestral pioneers.

ELIGIBILITY: To qualify for a Prairie Pioneer Certificate, applicant must be directly descended from an ancestor who settled in Illinois as follows:

Prior to statehood (December 3, 1818) - gold seal with ribbon 1819-1850 - gold seal

1851-1880 - stamped seal

Applicant need not be a resident of Illinois, nor have ever lived in Illinois. Anyone may apply. After proof of direct descent has been submitted and eligibility has been determined, the certificate will then be mailed. A separate certificate will be issued for each ancestor properly submitted. If applicant wants additional certificates for one pioneer ancestor, proof of descent needs to be sent only once - just request additional certificates and send \$5.00 for each additional certificate needed.

INSTRUCTIONS:

Please complete the application to the best of your ability. 1.

When completing the straight-line lineage chart, please use maiden names when applicable. If you are unsure of any dates or information, place a question mark behind the data.

Documented evidence must accompany the application such as census records; birth, death, marriage records; school or church records; Bible records; military records; obituaries; estate records; land records; tombstone inscriptions (give location of cemetary); county histories; etc. DO NOT SEND ORIGINAL DOCU-MENTS. Please submit COPIES ONLY, as all applications and verifying material will become the property of the Illinois State Genealogical Society.

Prepare a 3 x 5 index card for each ancestor on the straightline lineage chart. Place that name in the upper left hand corner with your name and address on the reverse side of the
